FREE VACCINATION AGAINST SEASONAL INFLUENZA FOR THE ENTIRE NUNAVIK POPULATION

Protect yourself, get vaccinated against the flu!

Kuujuuaq, November 6, 2014 – The Department of Public Health of the Nunavik Regional Board of Health and Social Services (NRBHSS) wishes to announce that the vaccination campaign against seasonal flu (influenza) will begin November 10 and will continue until the end of flu season. As is the case every year, vaccination is offered free of charge to the entire Nunavik population.

Influenza (flu) is a highly contagious infection of the respiratory tract. It is spread when an infected individual sneezes, coughs or speaks in the vicinity of other persons or through contact with objects contaminated with the virus, such as toys, utensils or unwashed hands.

Influenza can seriously affect you even if you are in good health. Some of its symptoms are fever, fatigue, muscle pain, cough and headaches. Influenza can cause serious complications among the most vulnerable individuals, such as children under the age of six months who cannot be vaccinated and individuals with chronic health problems. The virus circulates primarily from December to April.

You can protect yourself and your loved ones against influenza and its complications by getting vaccinated. The flu vaccine's effectiveness reaches its peak roughly two weeks after administration and its protection lasts from 6 to 12 months. The vaccine is also the best way of avoiding the transmission of influenza to the individuals most at risk. "Contrary to what some people believe, the influenza vaccine does not give you the flu. The injection consists of particles of the dead virus, which send a signal to the immune system to produce antibodies that will then prevent flu infection," explained Dr. Serge Déry, Nunavik Director of Public Health.

For individuals aged 2 to 17 years: a vaccine without needles

An influenza vaccine is available for young persons of Nunavik aged 2 to 17 years: Flumist, a vaccine that is sprayed into the nose. No needle is used. The youth receives a spray in each nostril and the process is complete. He or she is then adequately protected.

In Nunavik, vaccination is offered to the entire population aged six months or older, regardless of gender or medical condition. However, certain groups are at greater risk of catching or spreading influenza. If you are among one the groups listed below, it is strongly recommended that you get vaccinated:

Individuals at high risk of complications:

- persons aged 60 years or older;
- children in good health aged 6 to 23 months;

- persons aged six months or older suffering from a chronic disease such as respiratory problems, diabetes or cardiac problems;
- residents of extended-care centres (elders' centre);
- pregnant women starting at 13 weeks of pregnancy.

Individuals at high risk of spreading influenza:

- health workers (employees of the health centres, CLSCs and residential centres as well as first responders);
- persons living with one or more persons at high risk of complications;
- workers of day-cares and the academic sector;
- workers of essential services (police officers, pilots, flight attendants).

To receive the influenza vaccine, consult your CLSC for the vaccination schedule.
